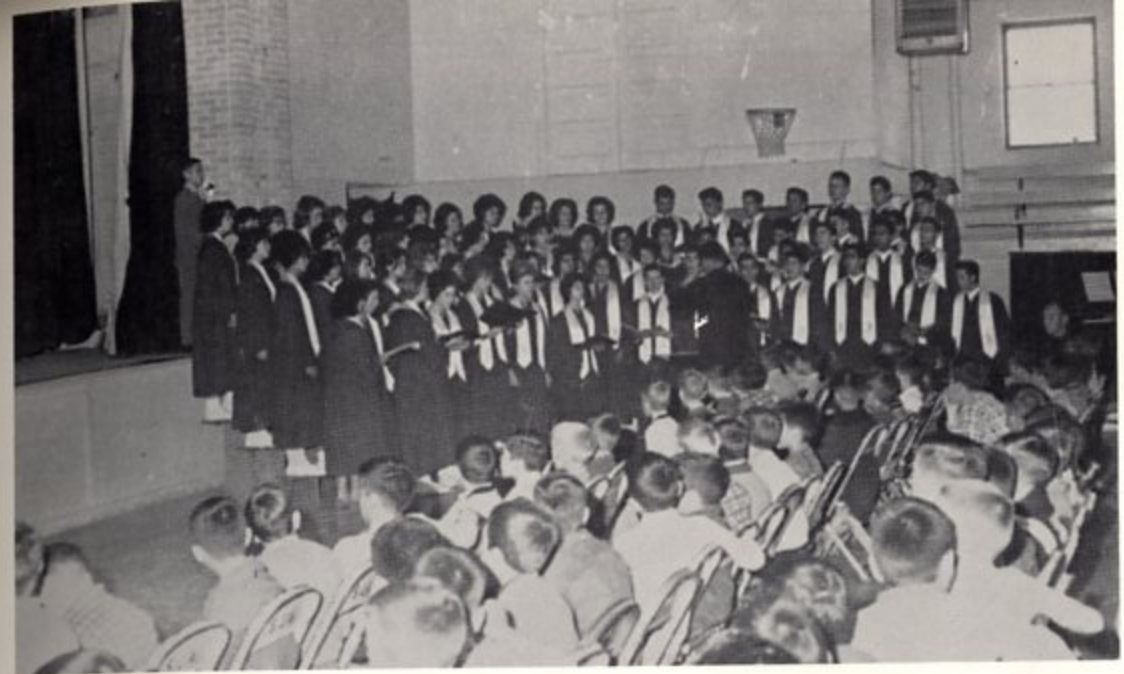

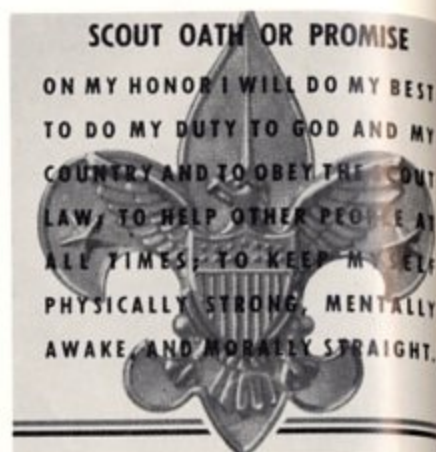

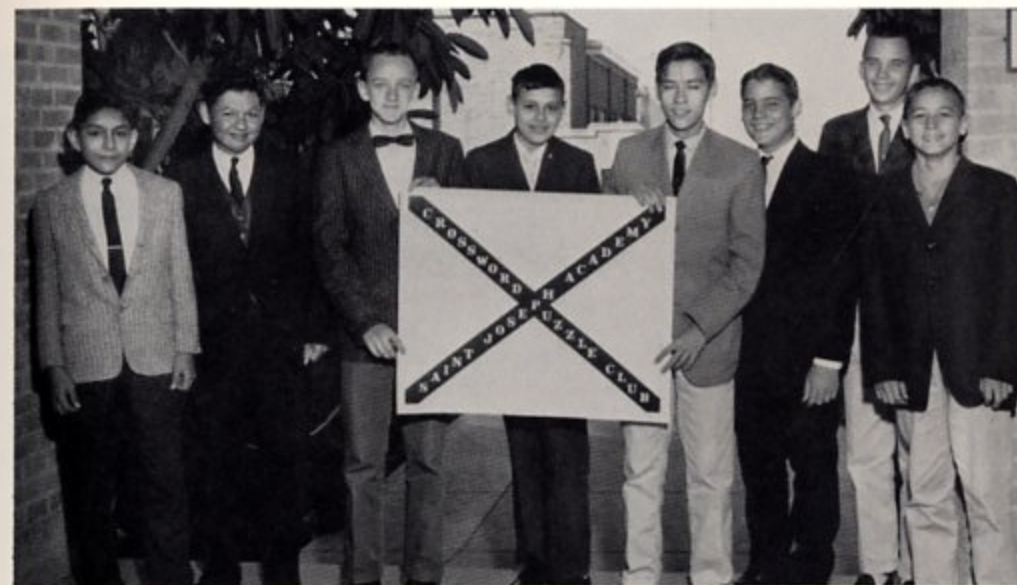

ST. JOSEPH'S 6 CASTROVILLE 6

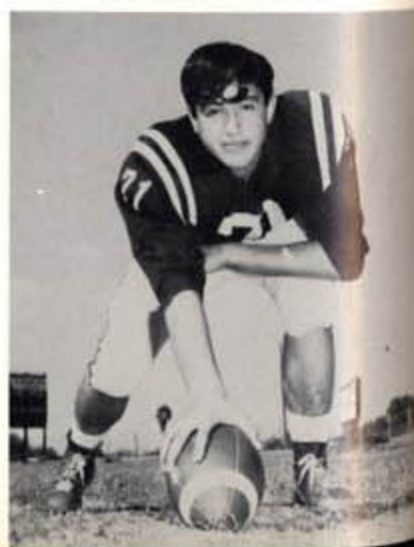

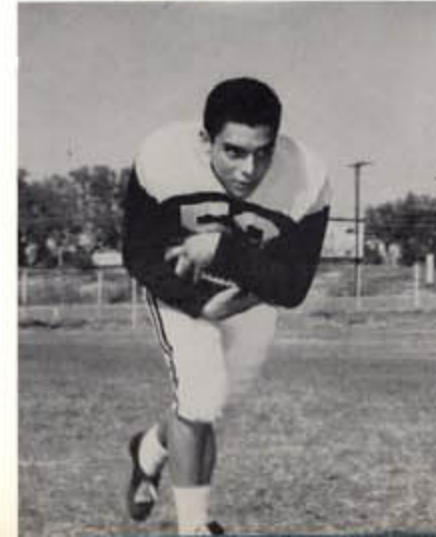

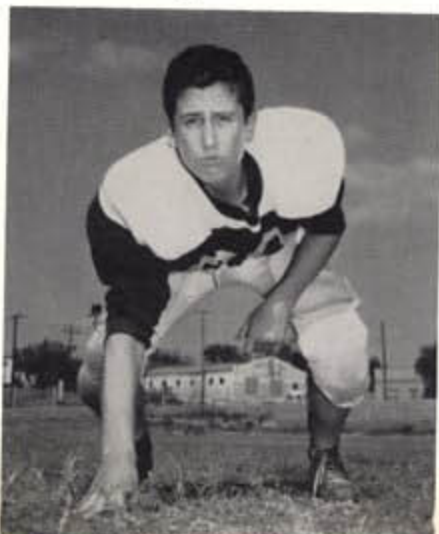

ANTLERS 9 BROWNSVILLE 6

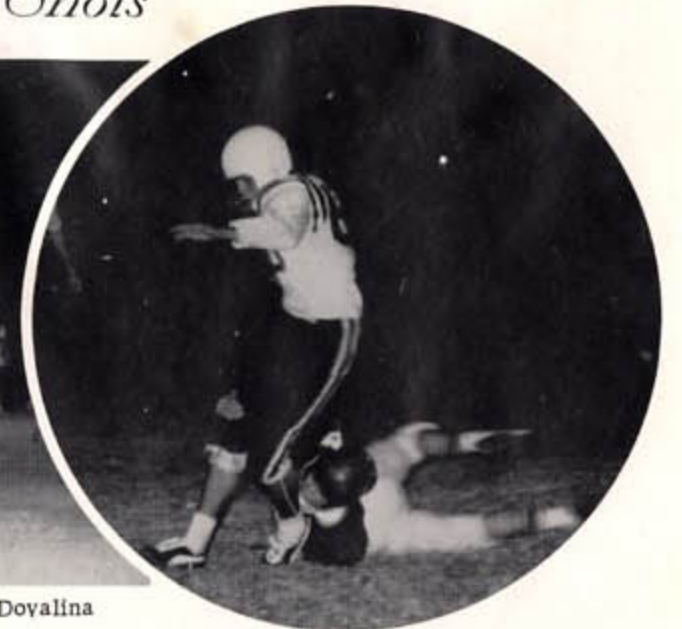

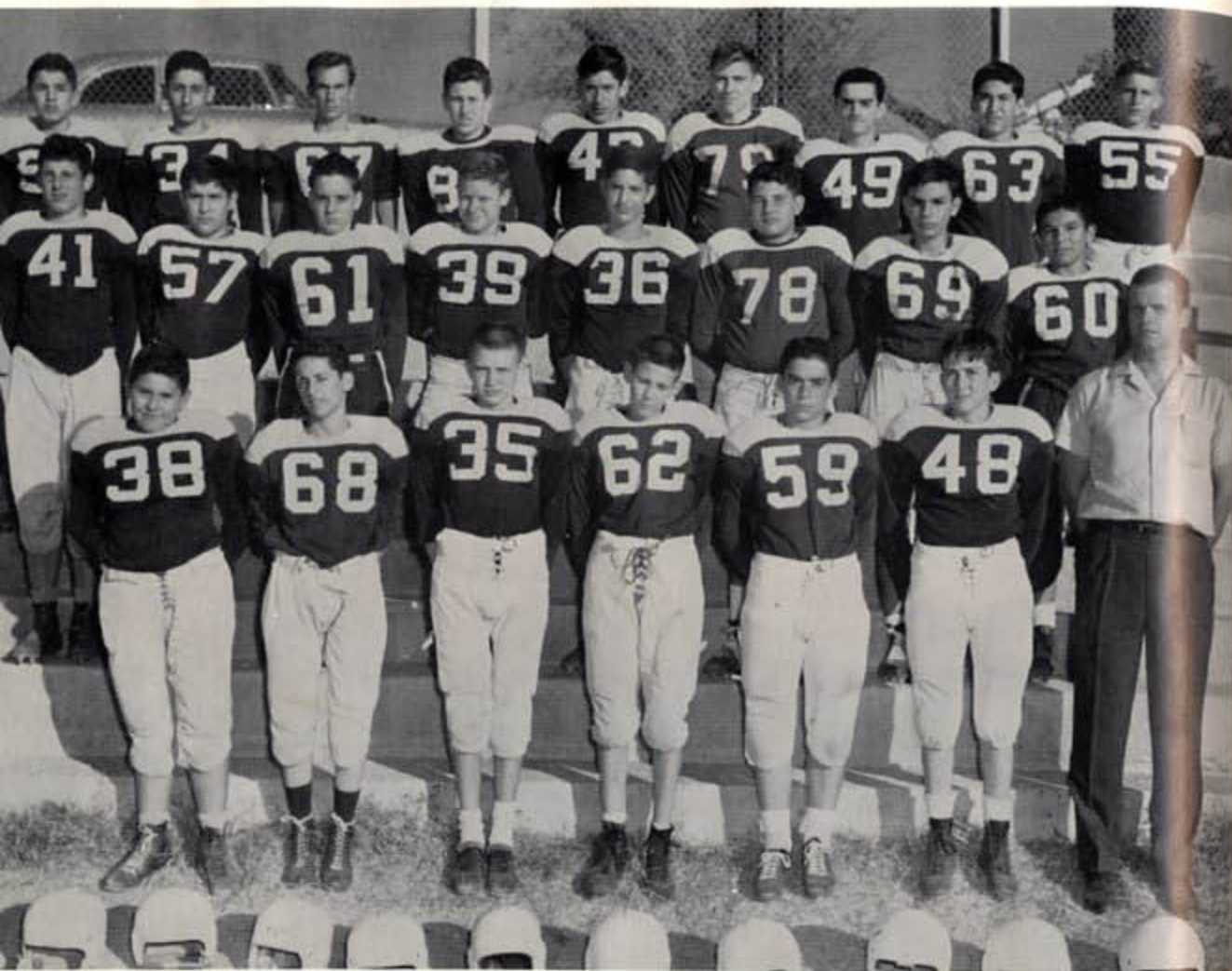
