




Brother William checks the Senior due's list prior to the Senior trip to the state capital.




### BROTHER FRANCIS BERNARD F.M.S.

### BROTHER ROBERT NOLAN F.M.S.


#### FRESHMAN B CLASS

### EIGHTH GRADE CLASS








### BROTHER PAUL JOHN F.M.S.

#### BROTHER ALPHONSE LOUIS, F.M.S.


#### SIXTH GRADE CLASS

### FIFTH GRADE CLASS






### MR. REECE HUNTER

#### INSTRUCTOR IN ART



### RICHARD MORALES "RICHARD"


#### PRESIDENT

### VICE-PRESIDENT



### BERNARDINO CARDENAS "NINO"


#### TREASURER


### ALFONSO SANCHEZ SOSA "FONSO"


### SERGIO ARIZOLA "LA VIBORA"


### EDUARDO D. BARRERA "BARRERA"




### CESAR BENAVIDES "CESAR"


### JUAN A. CAVAZOS "JUAN"


### DANIEL COVARRUBIAS "COVA"

assured, Fitz!




### TRUMAN GUY ELLISON "GUY"


### JOSE F. FLORES "JOE"


### ABRAHAM GARCIA, JR. "ABRAHAM"


### ERNESTO GONZALO LUGO "LUGO"




### JOHNNY MARTINEZ "JOHNNY"


### MARCO A. PINEYRO "MARK"


### MANUEL E. RAMIREZ "MEMO"




## HECTOR MANUEL RANGEL "RANGER"


### EDWARD SALINAS "EDDIE"


#### RONALD SUNESON "RONNIE"


### DOUGLAS TELLANDER "DOUG"


