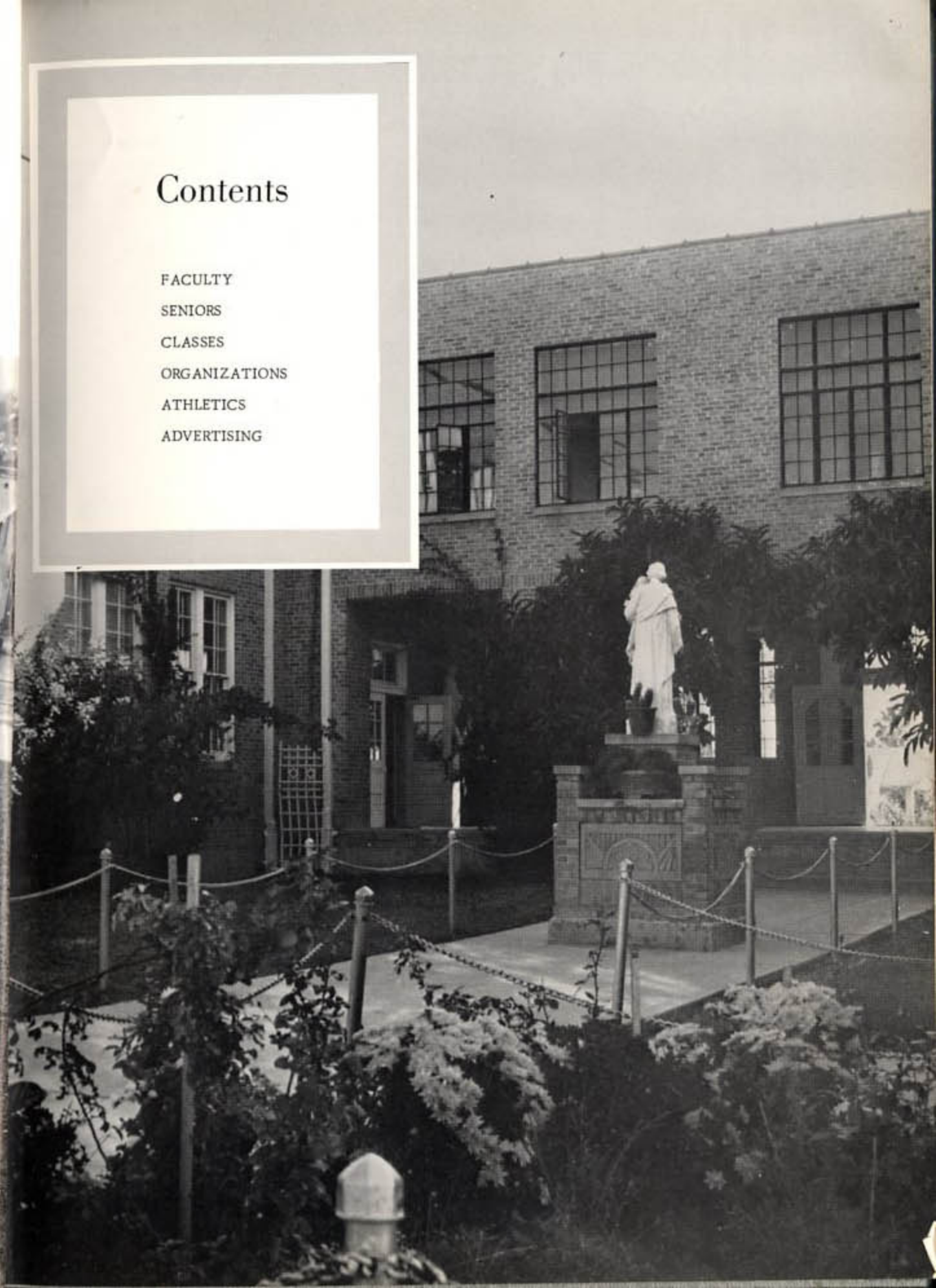
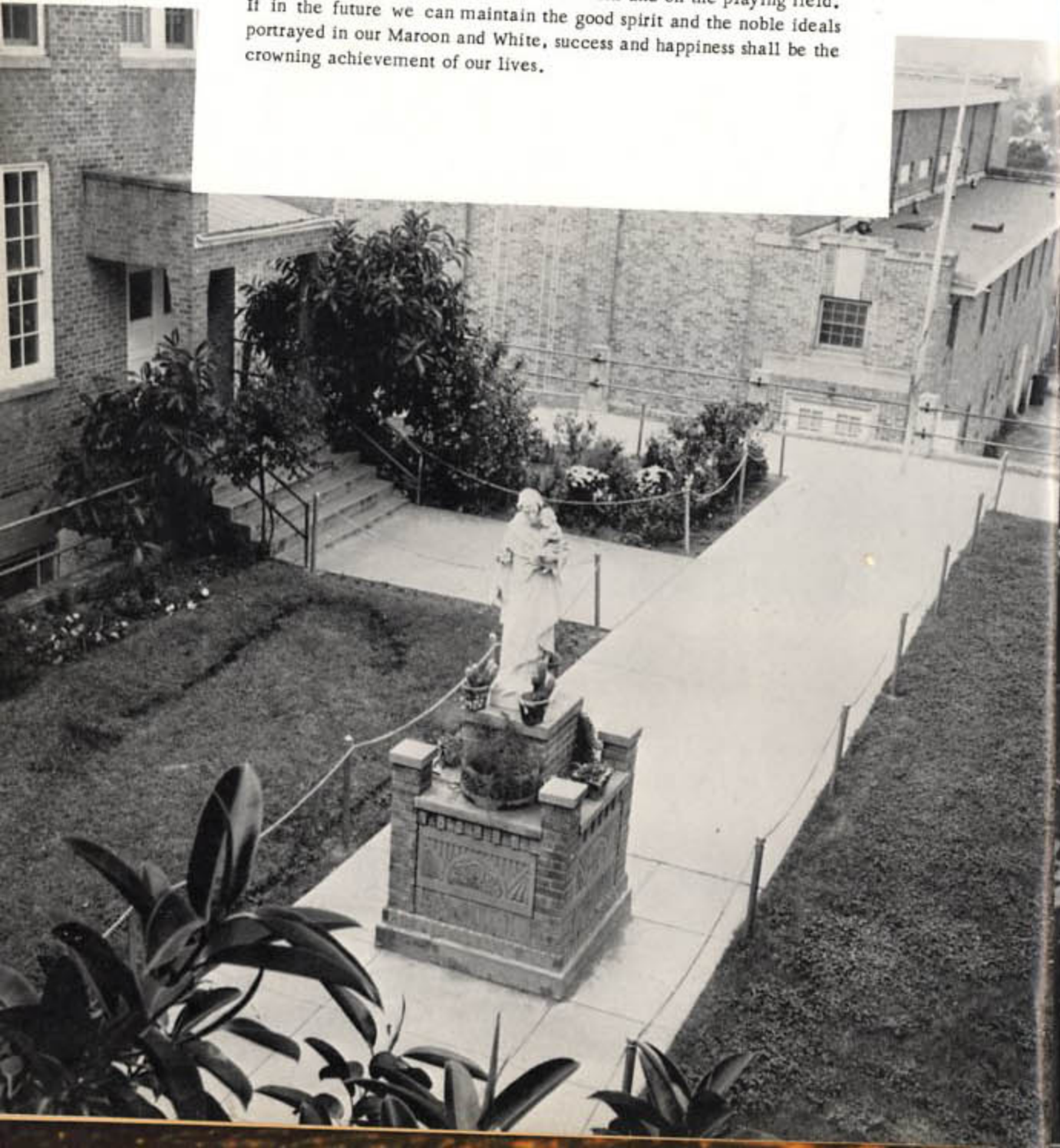

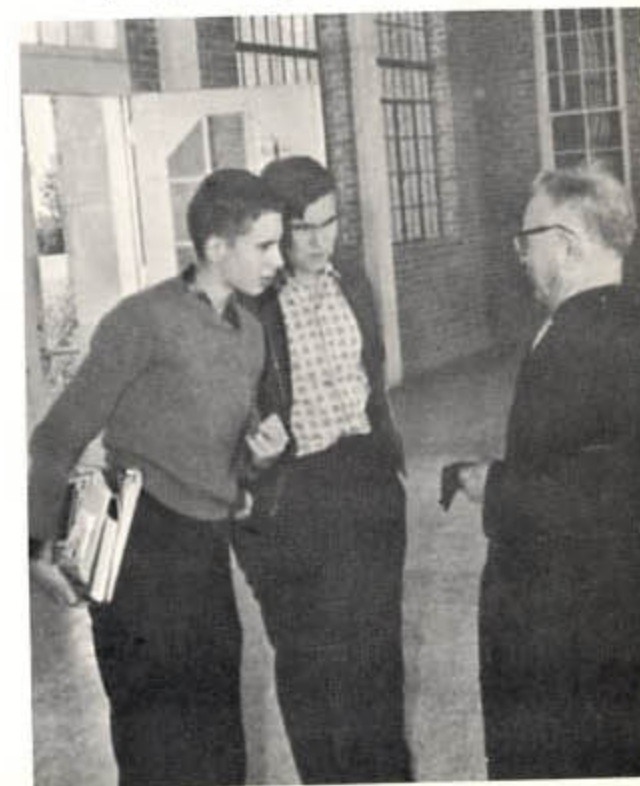

JUNIOR CLASS

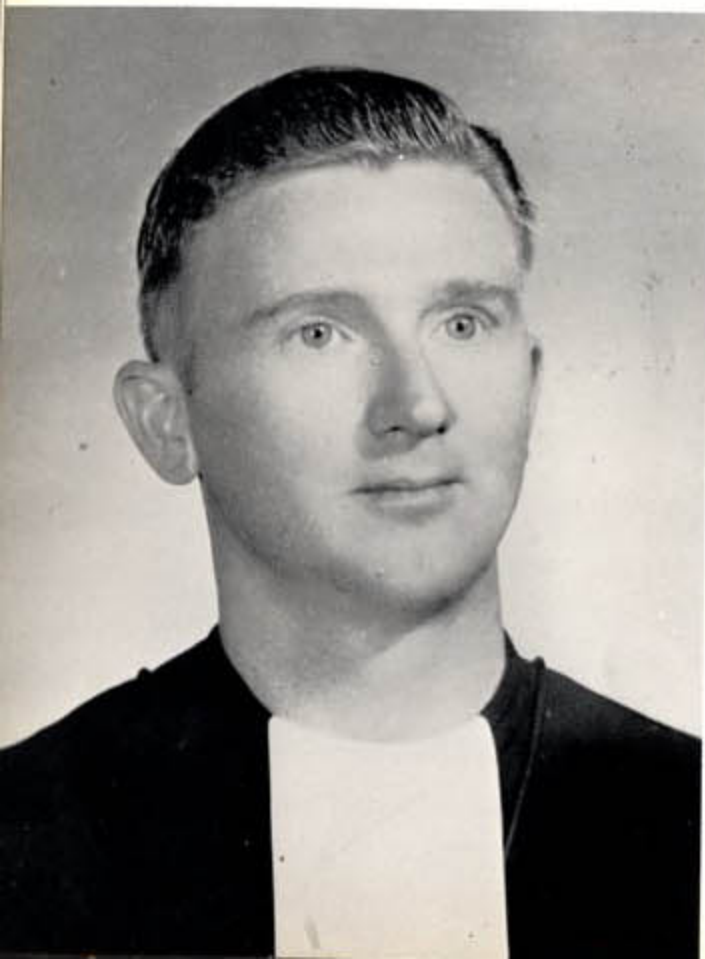

SEVEN "B" CLASS

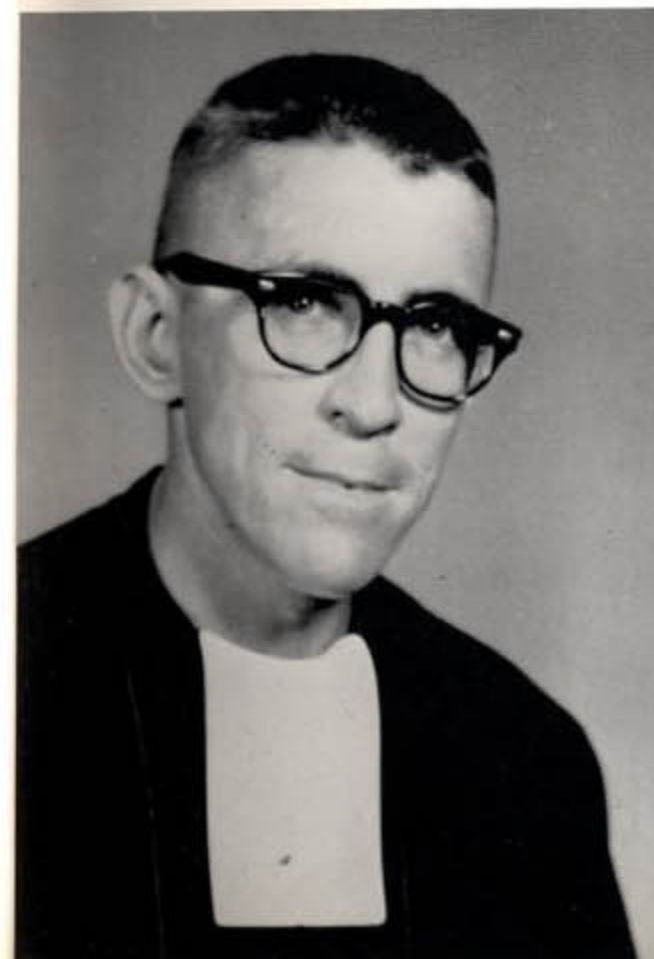

FIFTH GRADE CLASS

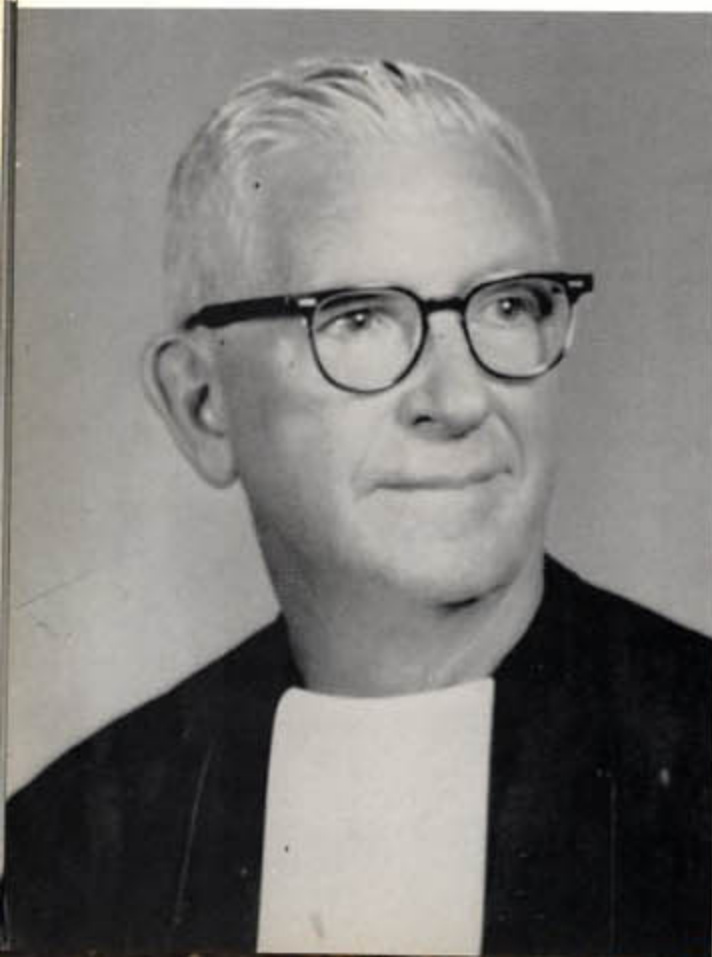

INSTRUCTOR IN ART

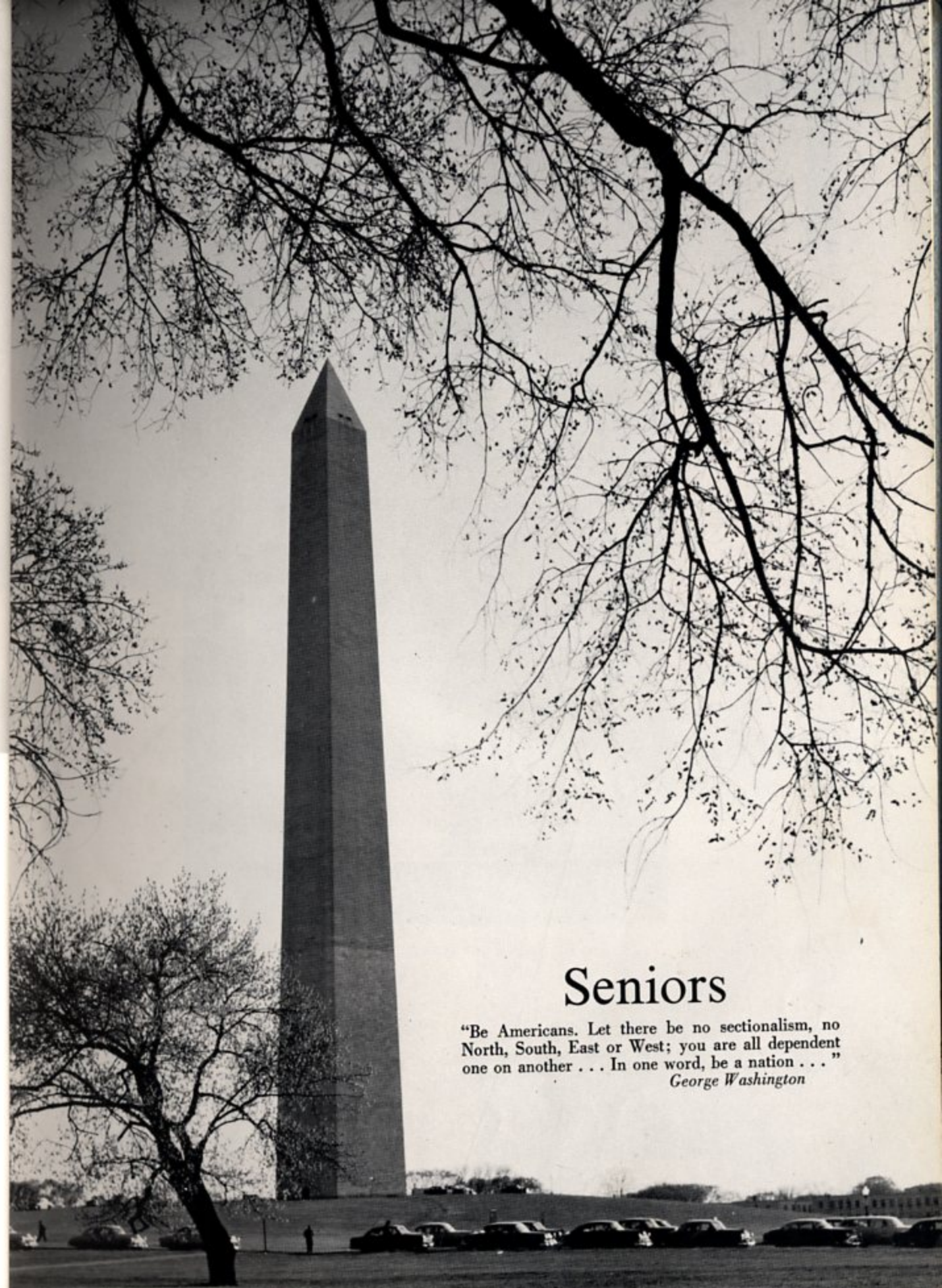

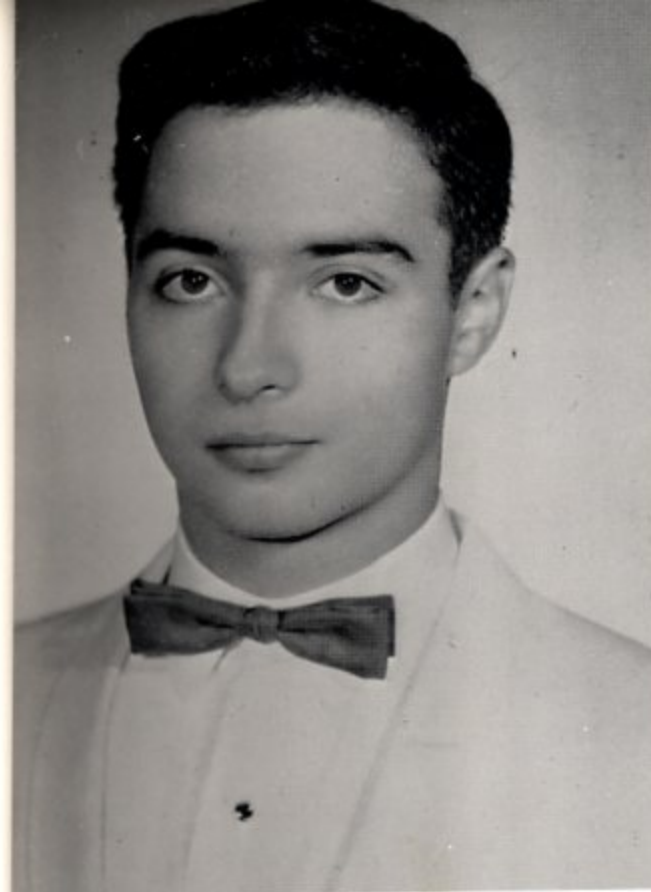

"RICHARD"

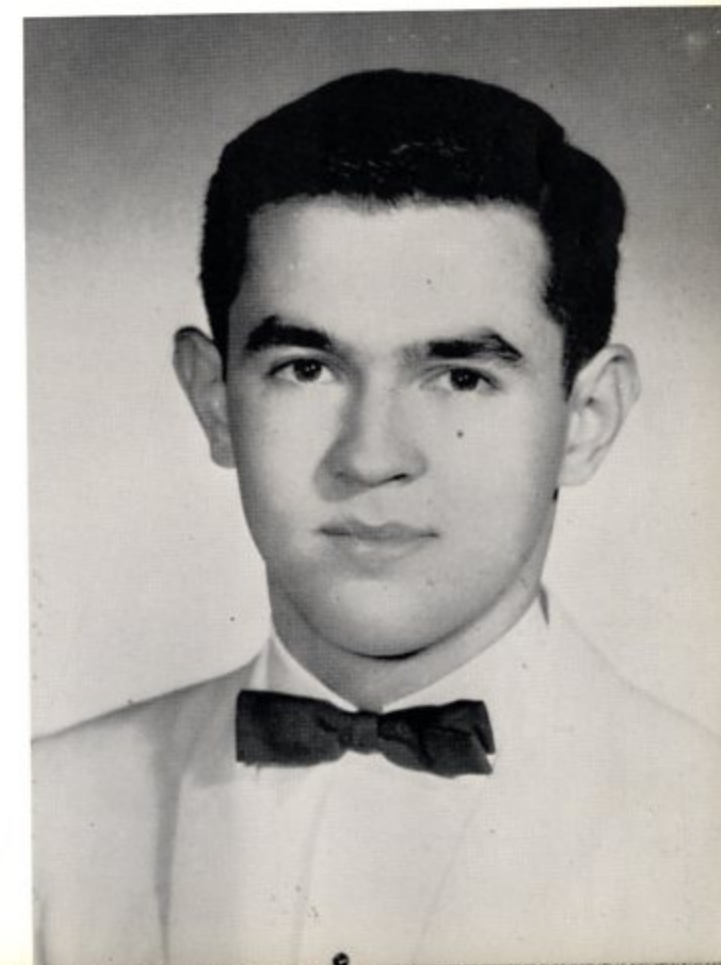
PRESIDENT

VICE-PRESIDENT

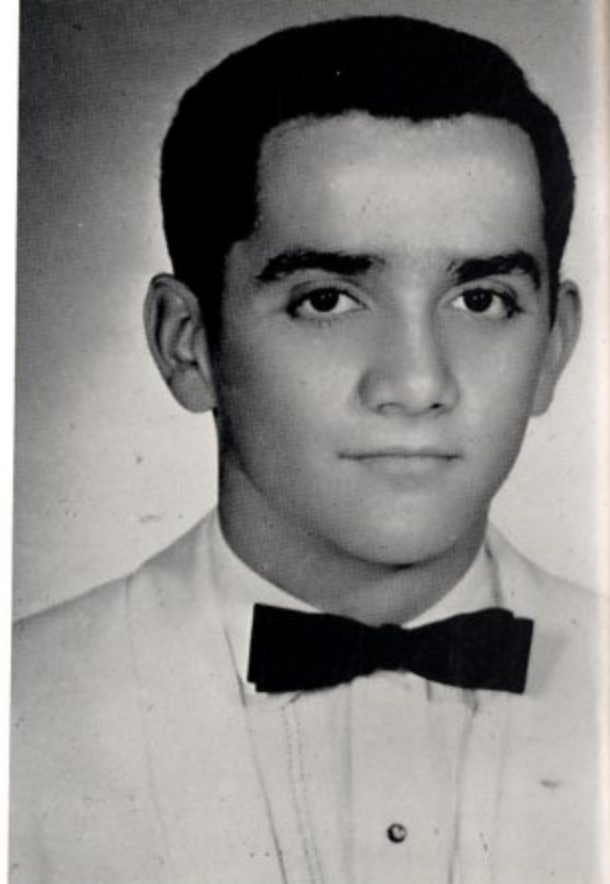

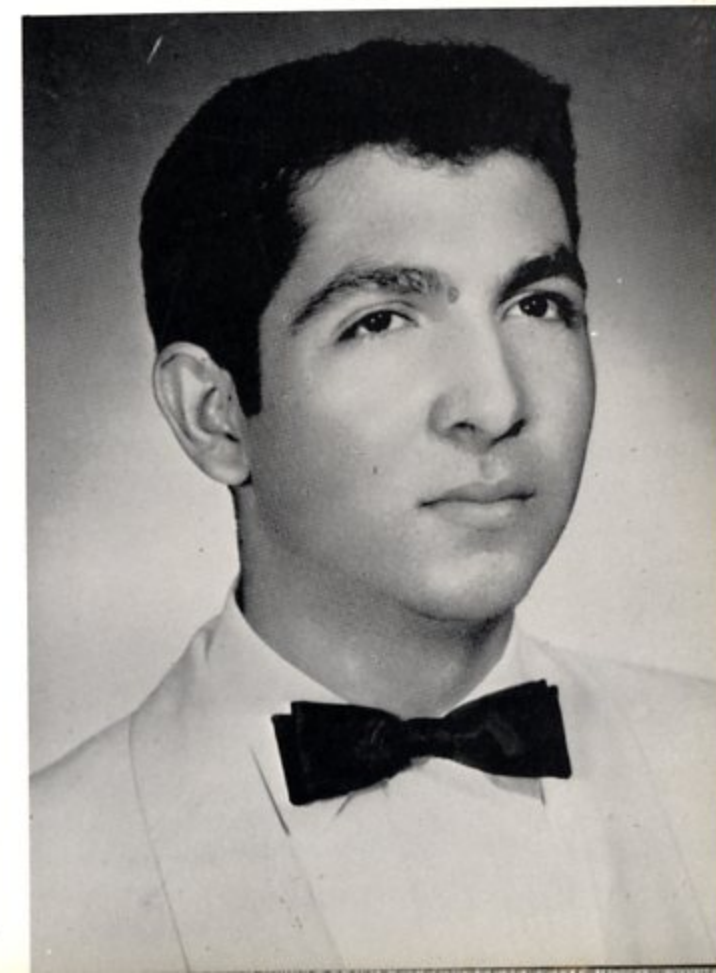
ALFONSO SANCHEZ SOSA

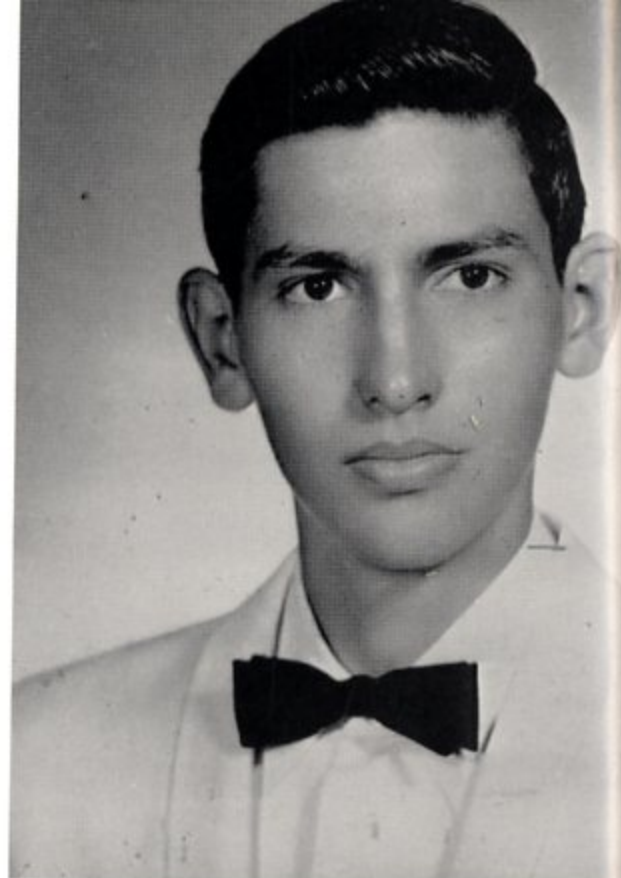
SERGIO ARIZOLA

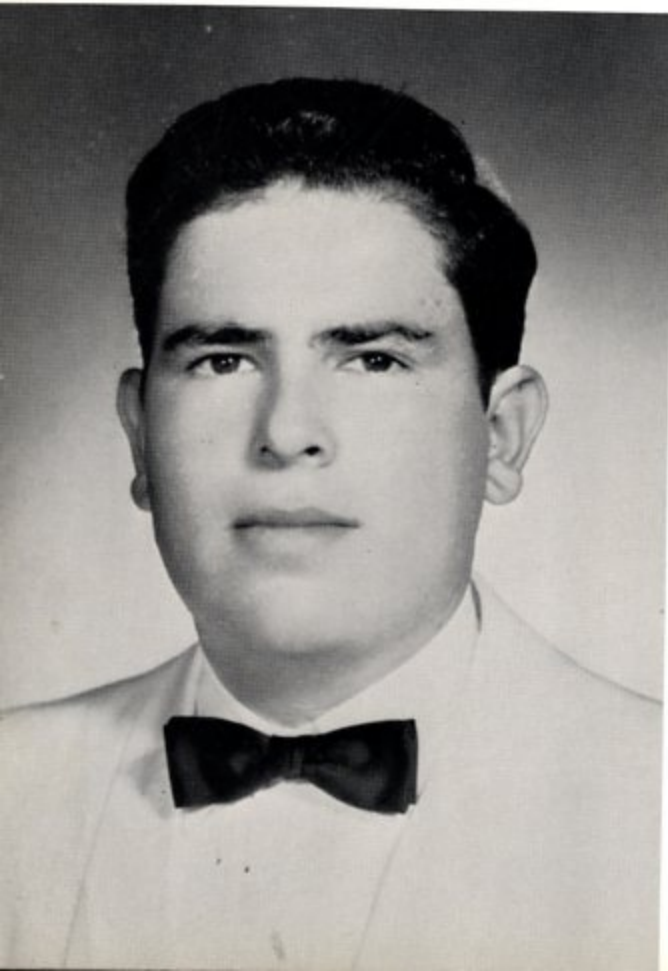
EDUARDO D. BARRERA

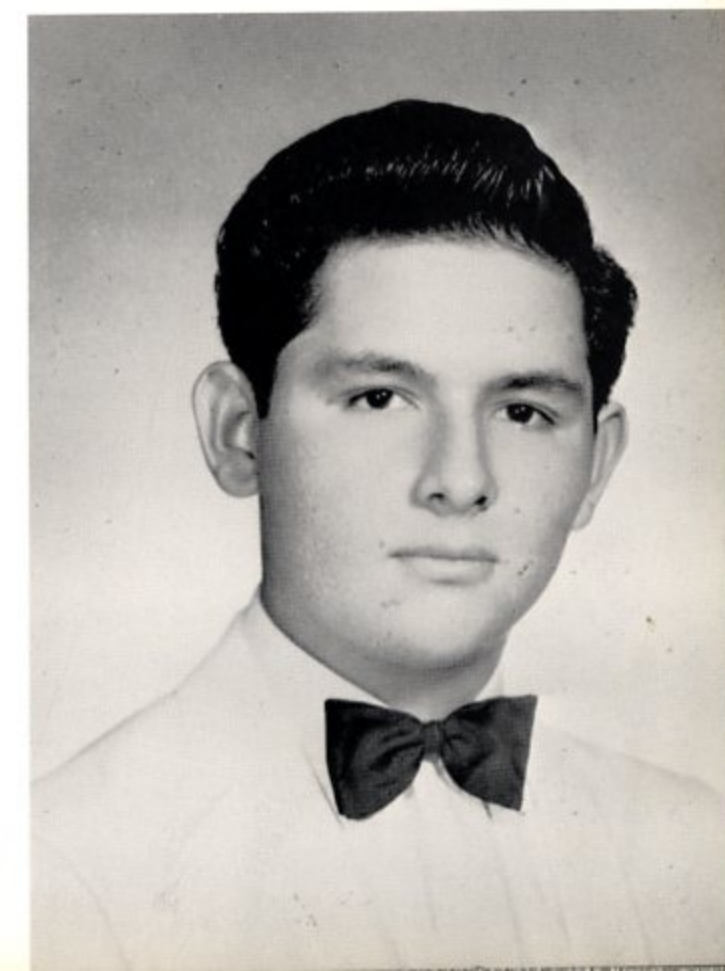


CESAR BENAVIDES

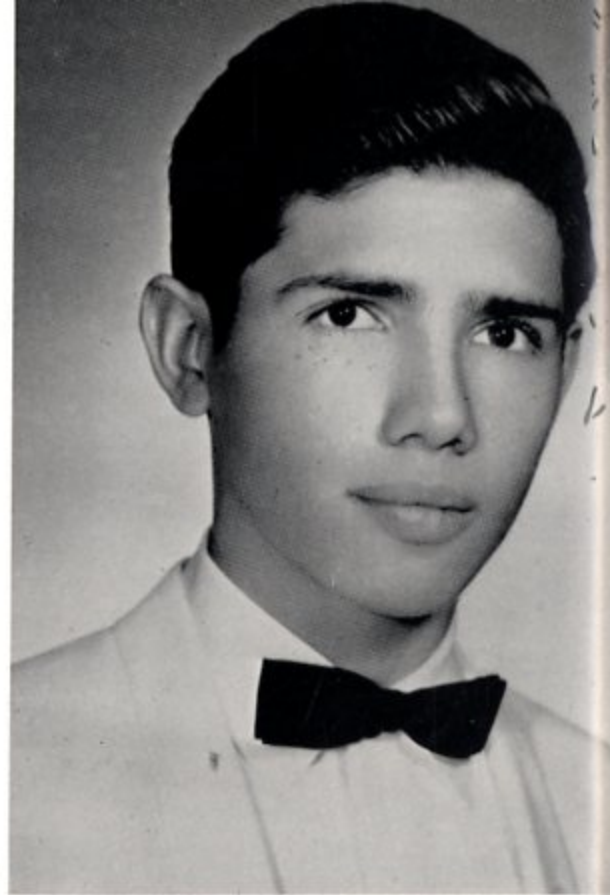
JUAN A. CAVAZOS

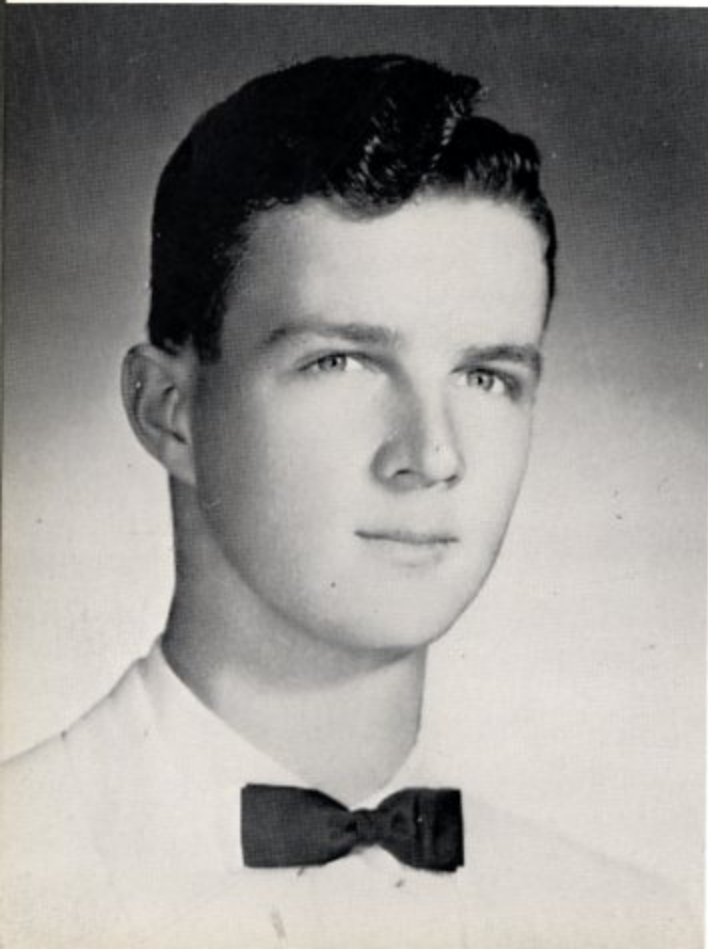
DANIEL COVARRUBIAS

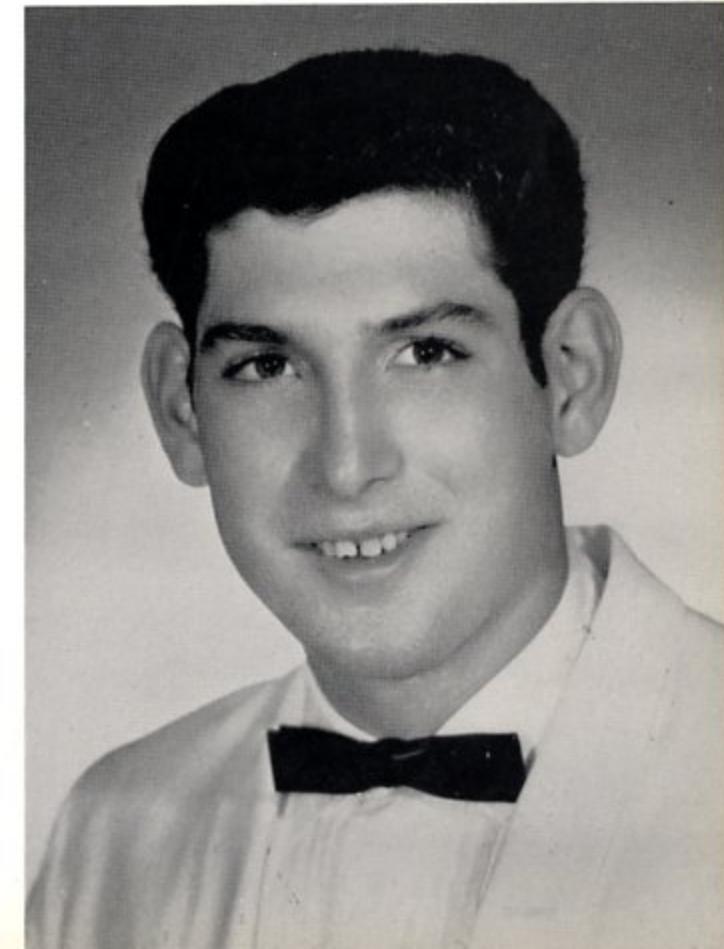


TRUMAN GUY ELLISON

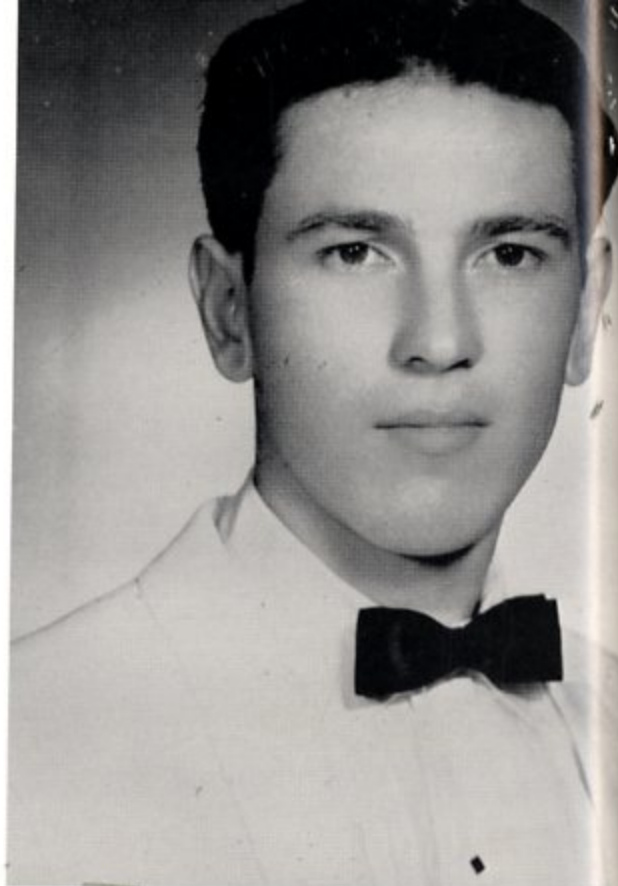
JOSE F. FLORES

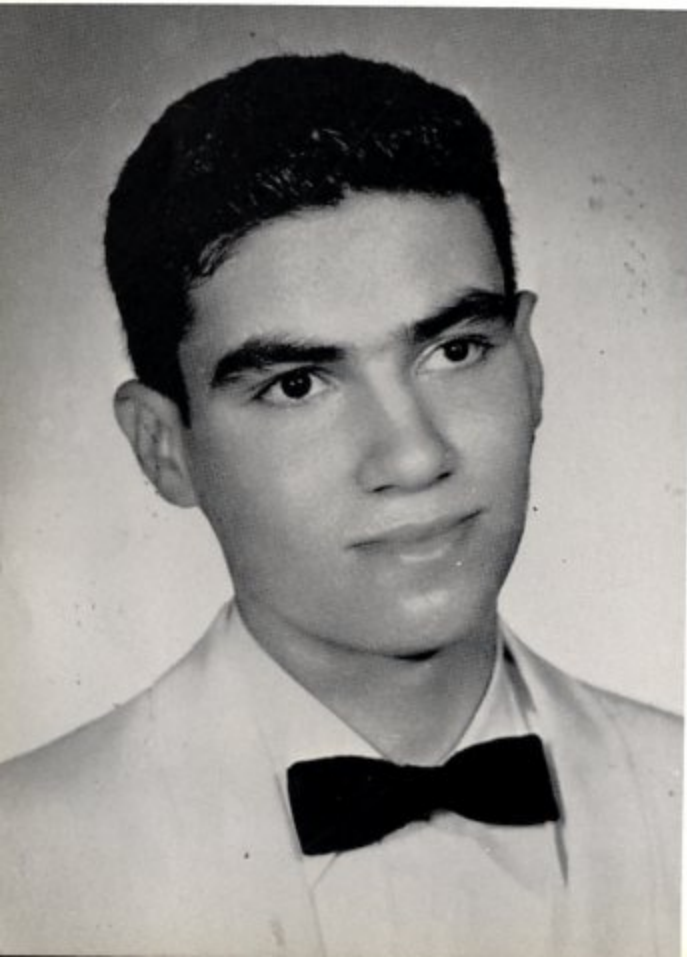
LUIS GUERRA

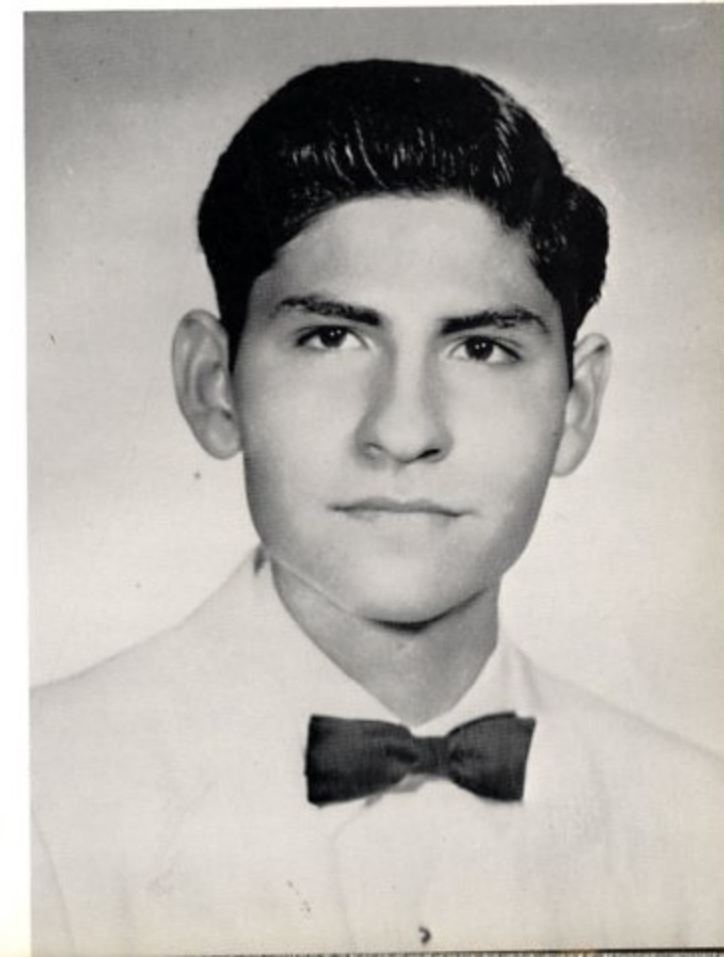
REYNALDO GONZALEZ, JR.

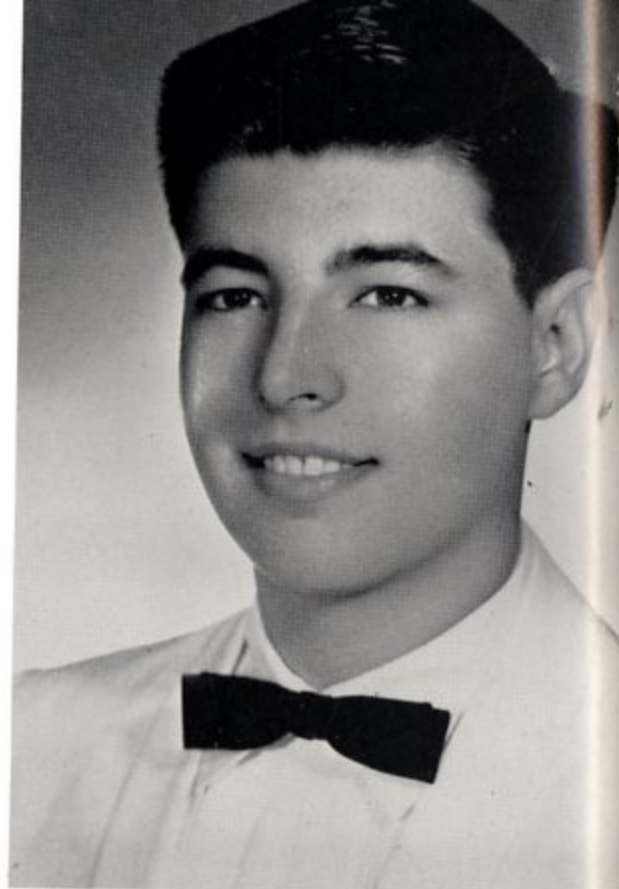
ERNESTO GONZALO LUGO

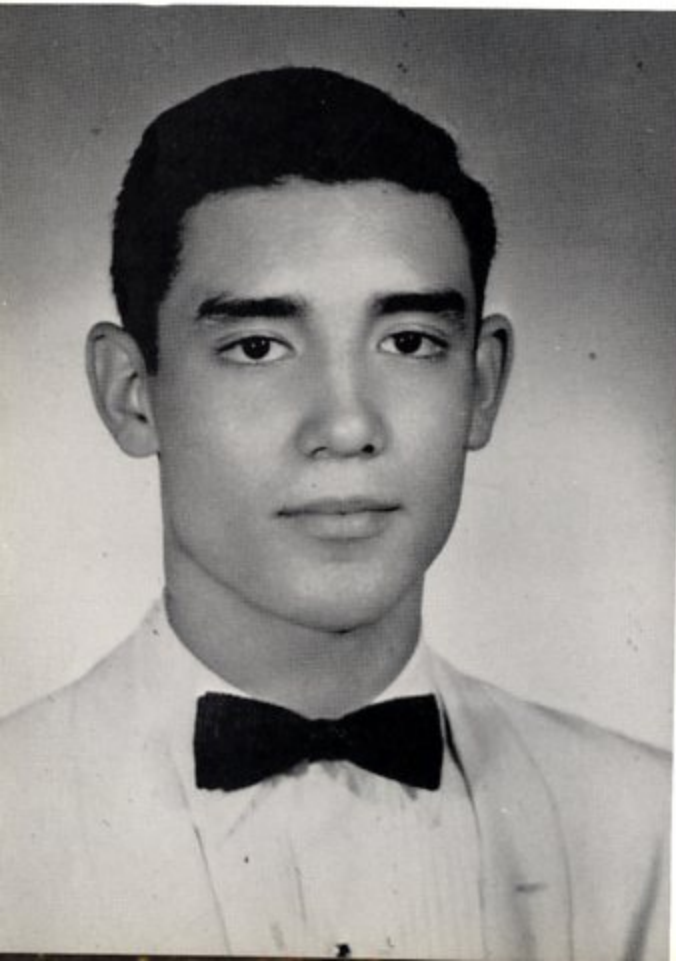
BILLY MARTIN

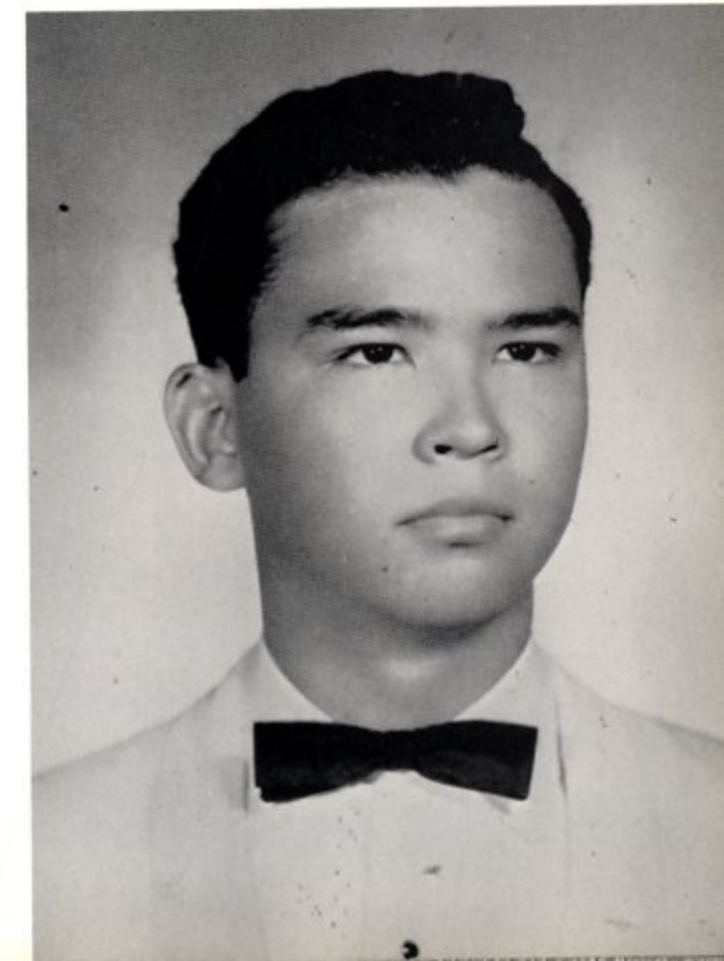


JOHNNY MARTINEZ

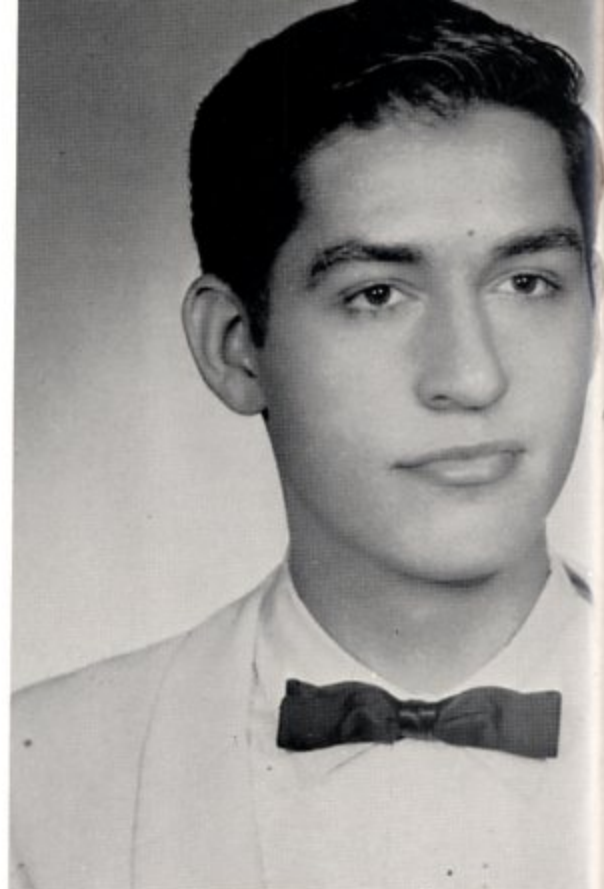
MARCO A. PINEYRO

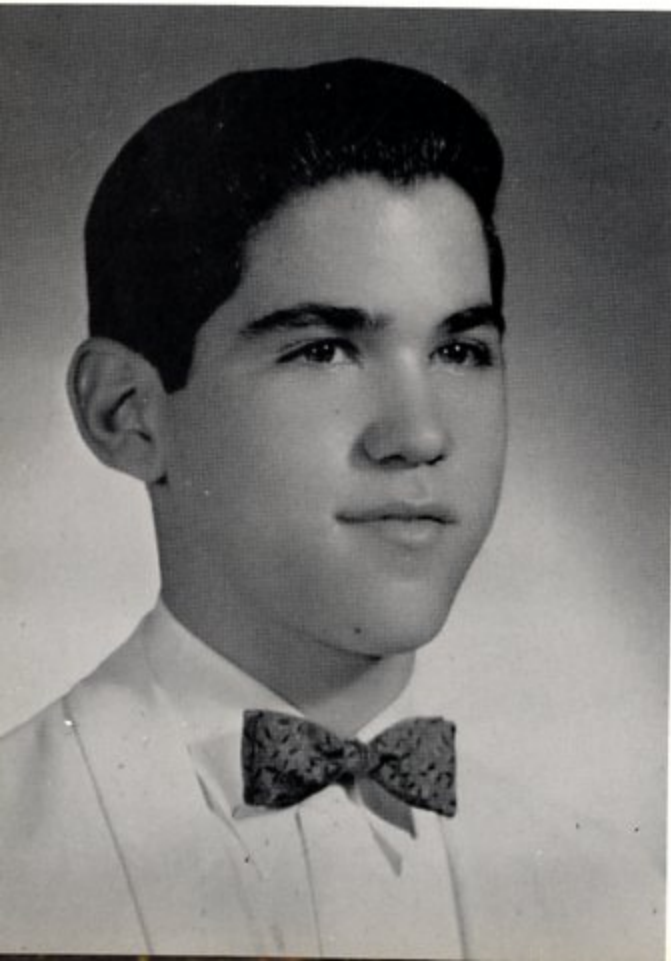
MANUEL E. RAMIREZ

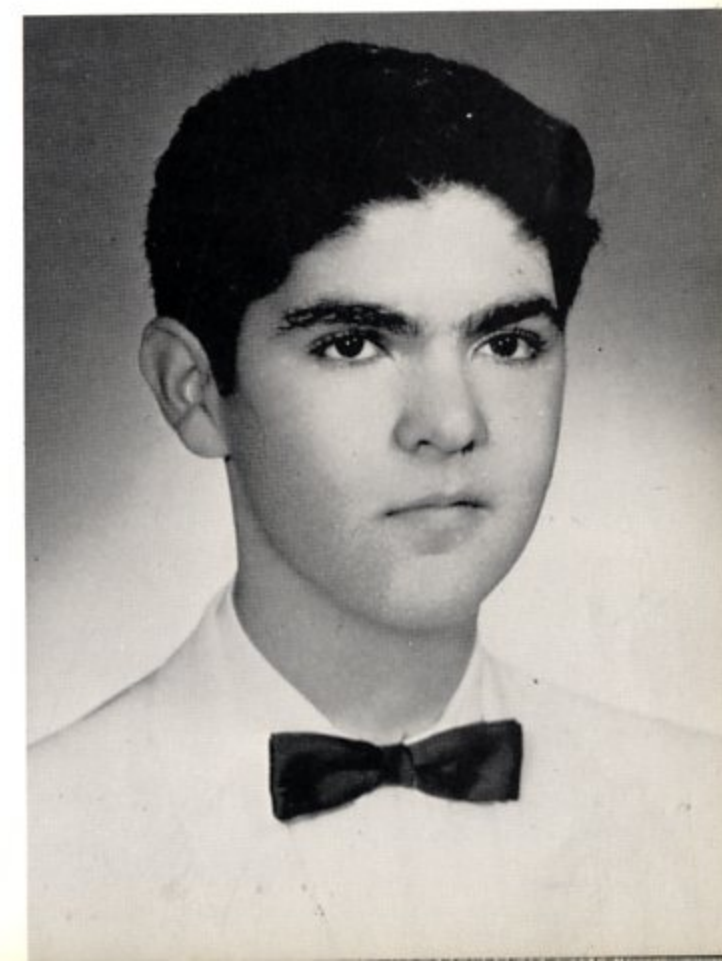


HECTOR MANUEL RANGEL

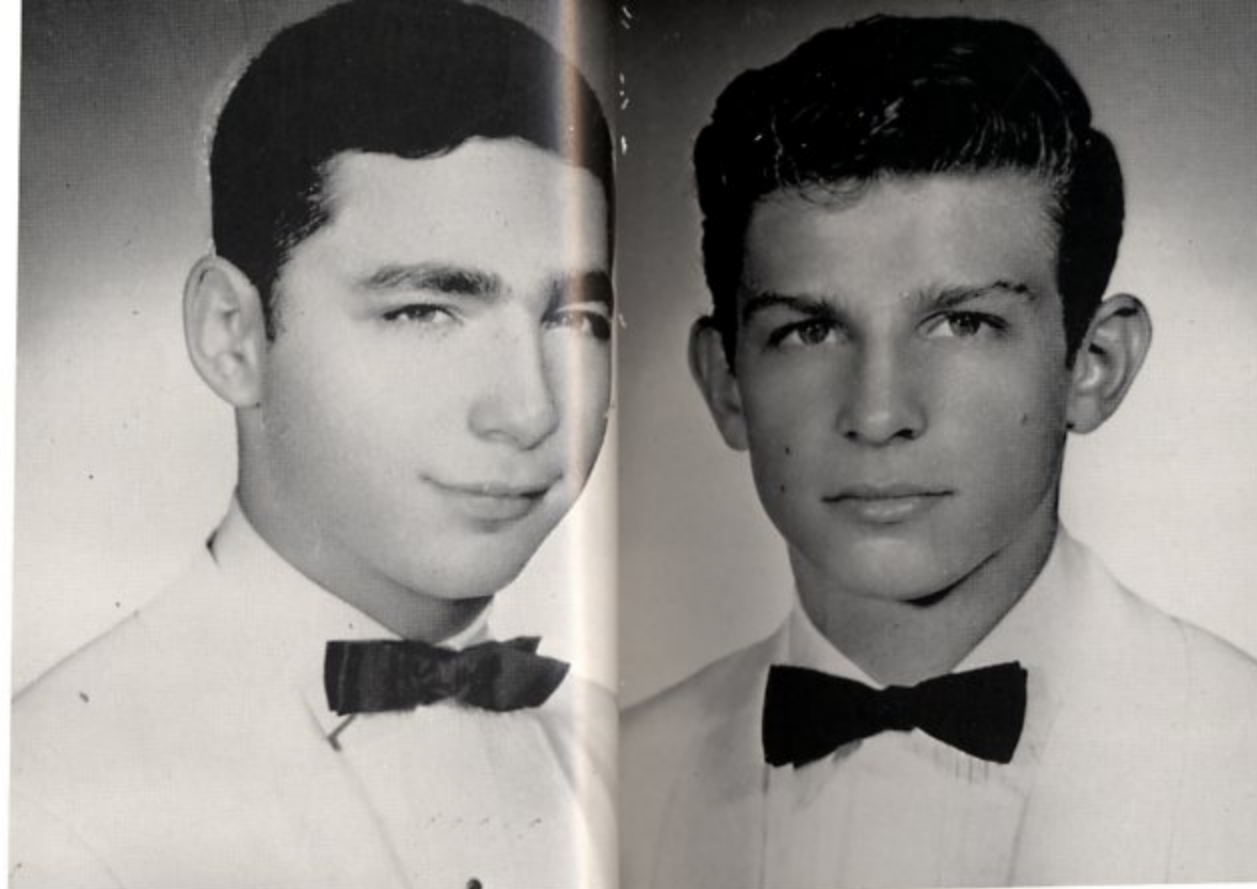
EDWARD SALINAS

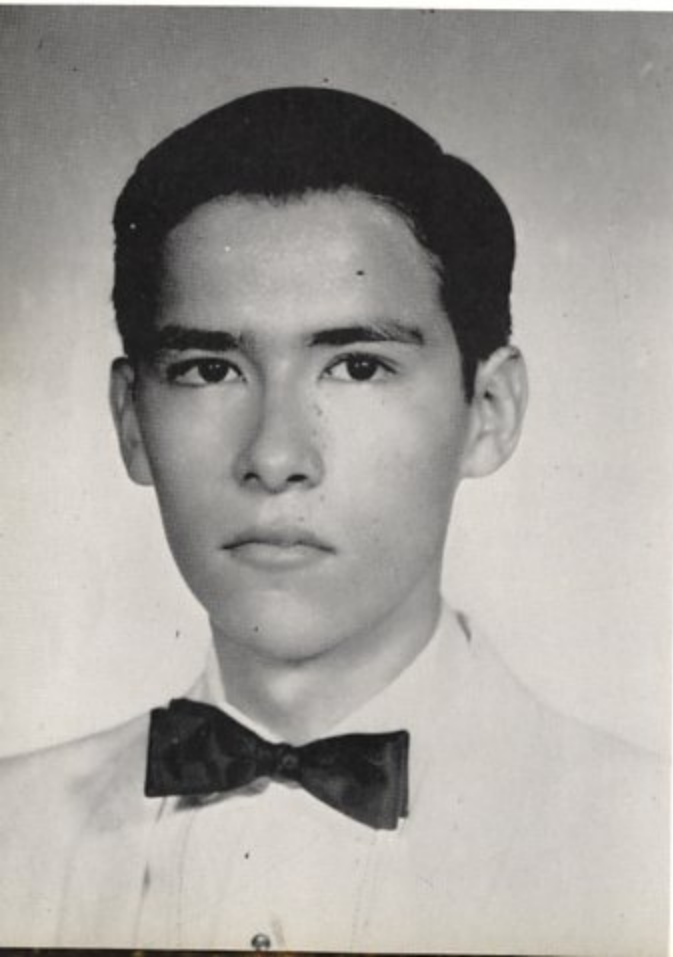
RONALD SUNESON

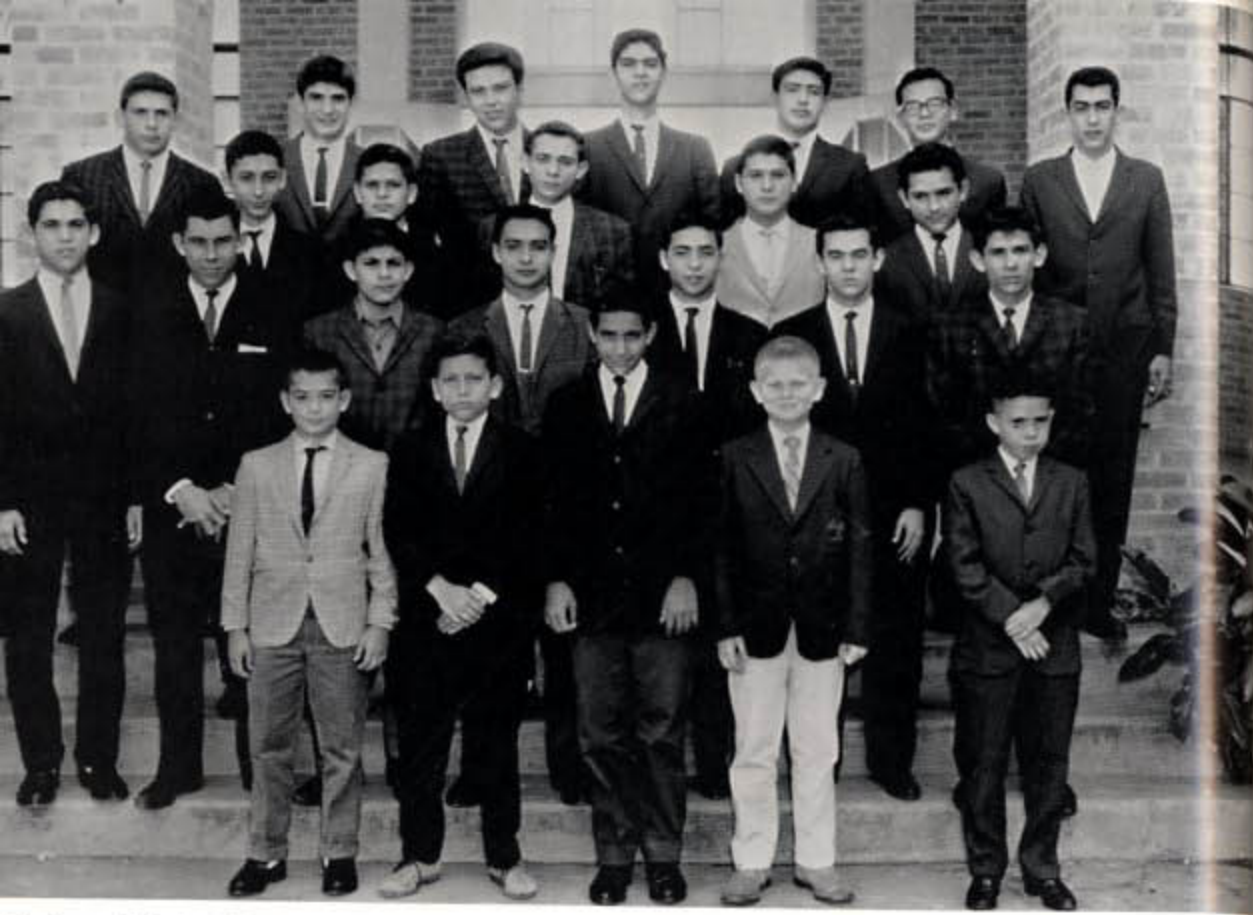

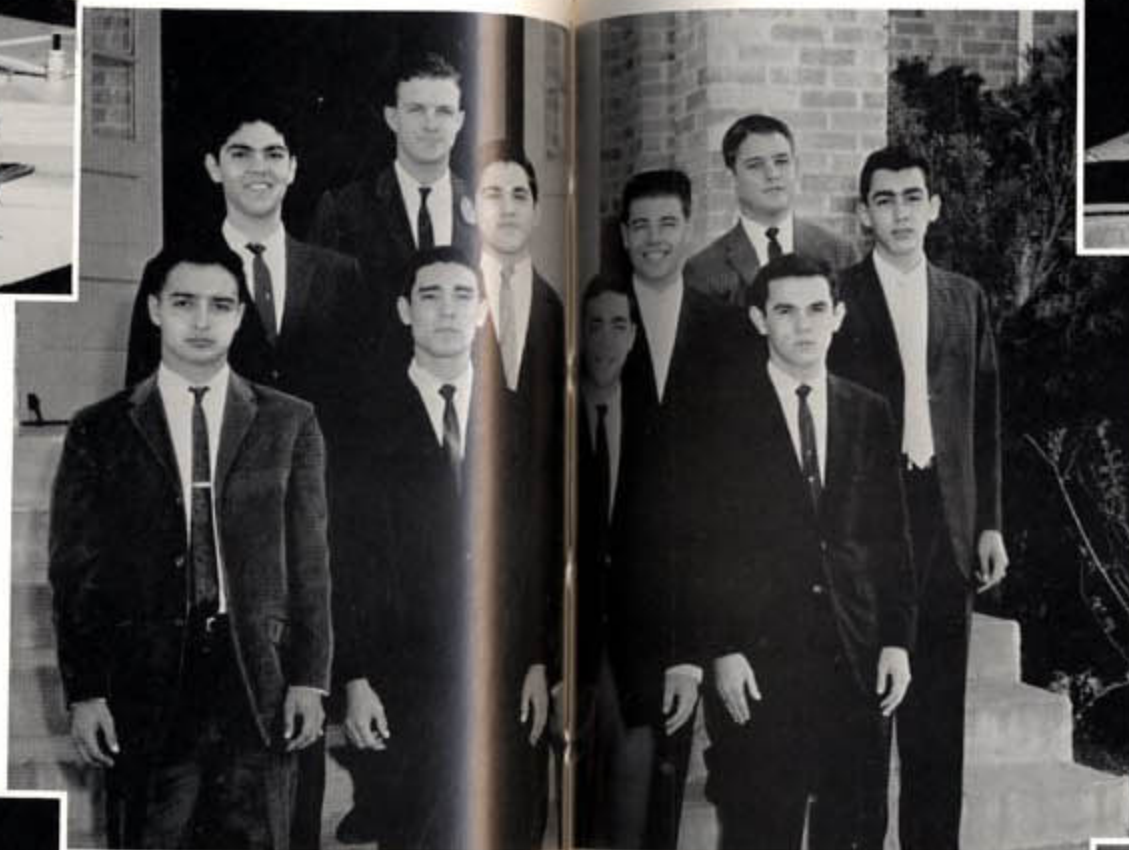

Mike Amici's block and the pile-up are examples of the "hard-nosed" football played all season by the Antlers.

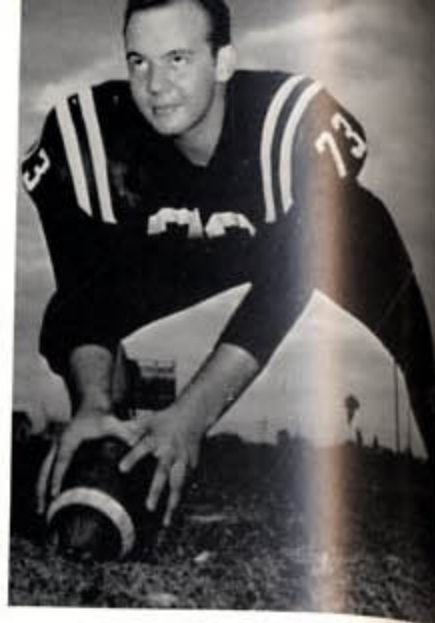

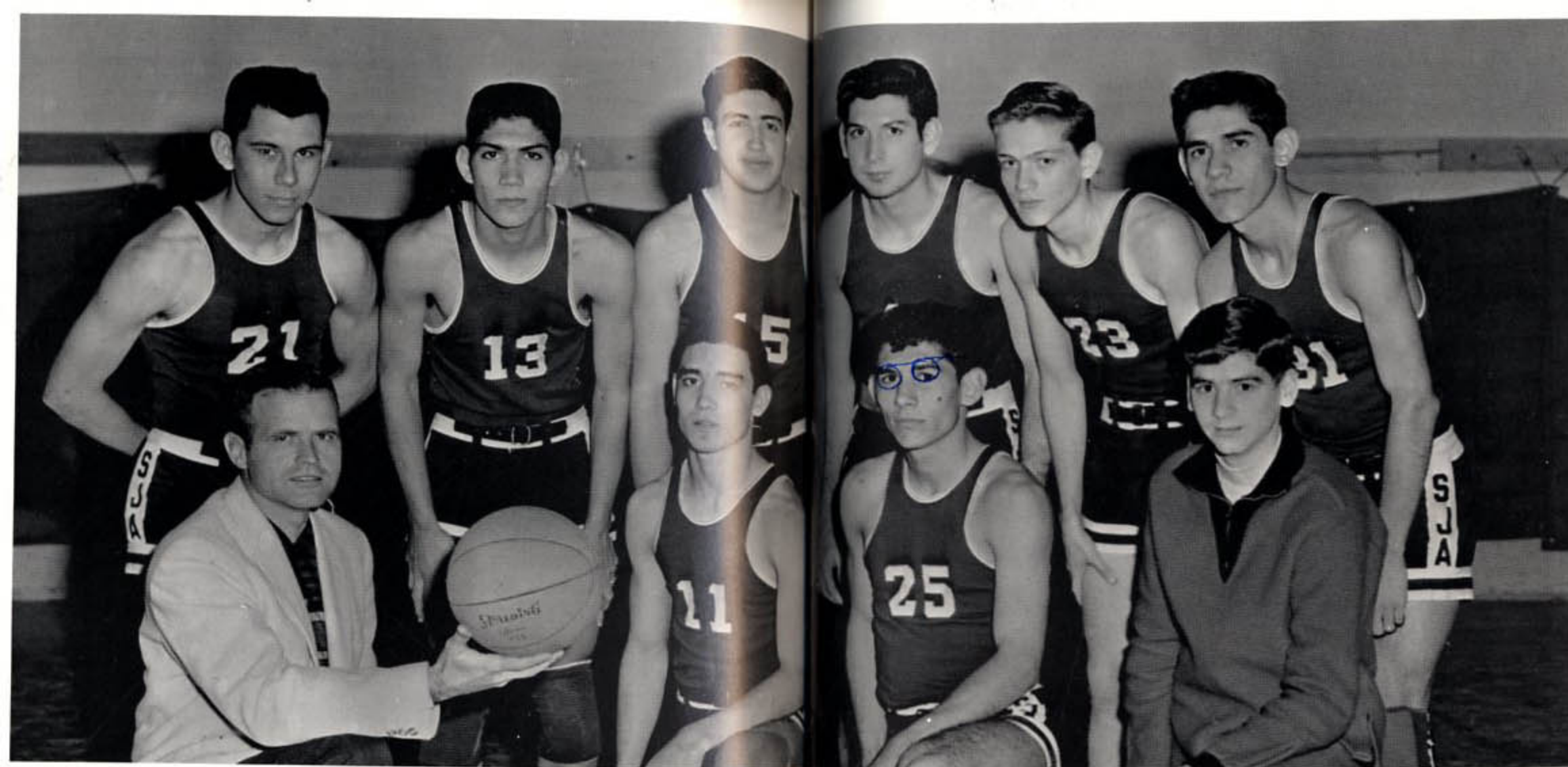
