# Sketch of High School

Outstanding features of the last two sessions may be briefly listed as follows: Introduction of a thorough and systematic supervision of class room instruction; a detailed study and reorganization of club work with the result that the school now has thirteen club organizations as follows:—five public speaking clubs, a dramatic club, a book review club, a kodak club, a natural science club, a sewing club, an English-Spanish club, an orchestra, and a girls choral club; specialized supervision of organized sports for both boys and girls; a substantial

enlargement of the commercial department with two distinct branches—accounting and secretarial—with a special teacher in charge of each; a complete introduction of the semester system of mid-year promotion plan; reorganization and rehabilitation of the library to meet the students and class needs: the installation of Vocational Home Economics; the introduction of physical culture for boys and the cultivation of a better informed school public.

This sketch in the 1928 "La Pitahaya" carried this statement: "Much improvement is in contemplation. A new high school plant is needed badly. Its realization must be accelerated or the school and its clientele suffer." We are still waiting for the new high school plant where an enlarged program of work can be inaugurated.

Since this sketch was written for last year's "La Pitahaya", the number of units has been increased to four. The infant member of the plant is known as the Home Economics Cottage, a tile-stucco structure erected to the rear

of the Annex and on St. Agustin Avenue Cottage, a tile-stucco structure erected to the rear of the Annex and on St. Agustin Avenue as a temporary structure to house the new department of Home Economics opened in September. This new cottage consists of a combination Living and Dining room with fireplace, a foods laboratory with built-in lockers and cabinets, a bedroom with bath, and a clothing laboratory. The building and equipment were installed at an expense approximating \$13,000 (Equipment \$5,000). Every room and laboratory is equipped with the most modern and improved furniture and fixtures.

The laboratories are equipped for classes of twenty, and it is significant that both the foods and the clothing department have been full throughout the year—one hundred twenty girls receiving training in home work and home-making throughout the year. Miss Huey, Head of the department, has personal charge of the foods division; she is assisted by Miss Griffis in the clothing division.

In equipping this cottage the most modern furniture and fixtures were installed. While the new cottage was constructed with the view of using it only two years, the equipment was installed with the idea of permanency.

Although the installation of the new courses in Home Making—foods and clothing—is the outstanding achievement of the year, other work has gone forward with interest. The Orchestra membership has grown to be twenty-five and new uniforms have been provided for both the choral Club and the Orchestra.



# History of the Class of '30



## The Laredo High School Journal






As usual, there was a special train. About three hundred and fifty went to San Antonio to witness the game with Brackenridge. A great deal of fun was had on this trip.


#### LAREDO 39—DEVINE 0




#### HARLANDALE 0—LAREDO 19

Laredo was one of the strongest contenders at the district. They were eliminated in the first round by Corpus who managed to win the district. They were later defeated by Harlingen.





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## The Special Train


While many of these pictures were censored we have enough to complete a panel and to raise cain with the folks back home. Some faces did not come out in these pictures so there had to be substitutions.
