

The background of the 1940 edition of La Pitahaya is the local color of our picturesque border city, its surrounding plains, green with onion and tomato farms, its chaparral-covered hills where graze herds of white-faced Herefords, and its western horizon where loom the blue mountains of Mexico.

Laredo is a combination of ancient and modern, of Latin and Anglo-Saxon culture. A romantic atmosphere lingers from the era of the conquistadores, suggested perhaps by the musical language of Spain, serenades on moonlight nights, and the sound of church bells on Sunday.

The modern aspect is everywhere in the streamlined buildings, such as our own Martin High School, and on paved streets, where one sees tourists, bound for Mexico, in long, shining automobiles.

Some of you who go out in the Class of 1940 will travel to far places, and, perhaps, looking over this book will partially assuage a homesickness for a land and time you once loved.

On the whole, the student body has shown appreciation of its cream-colored walls and its shining desks by refraining from the destructive practices so often evidenced by school buildings and school furniture.





CHOIR







THE GRID SEASON ON PARADE

Finding themselves in a new district, the Martin High Tigers entrained to their annual football camp on September 1, 1939, and began to sharpen their claws in order to be in good shape for their debut in District 15AA.

When the season began the Tigers were not rated as powerful contenders for the district crown by the sports writers. The Cats' poor and slow beginning in their district battles gave more support to the sports critics' predictions.

By the middle of the football campaign, Coaches Green and James developed such a good aggregation of football boys that after winning the opening game, and losing three conference games in a row, the Tigers managed to conquer the rest of their strong foes left on their strenuous schedule. In fact, the whole team improved so much that the Tigers managed, even though they were playing their first year in a new district, to finish in a tie for third place with Brackenridge.

At the annual Football Banquet held on December 18, 1939, Coach Green named twenty-six football lettermen, making it the largest number of athletes given letters in the history of the school. On this gala occasion, the Wilson-Norris trophy for the most valuable player of the year was awarded to David Nichols, captain of the team.

On December 15, Laredo was well represented on the District 15AA mythical eleven, as David Nichols was named All-District tackle, and later given All-State Honorable Mention in the Associated Press tabulations. Jesus Sanchez, stocky tackle, and Edward Jackson, stellar guard, who were mostly responsible for the Cats' great defensive showing during the season, were shy of only one vote to be awarded All-District berths.




ANTLERS DEFEAT TIGERS 21-0


















CATS ROUT JERSEYS 40-0








BENGALS EDGE OUT EAGLES 3-0




