BIZARRE, the Greeks would call the 1952 "La Pitahaya." We call it modern, youthful.


In the division pages Ronnie Bell, art editor, has applied a Greek art theme to modern youth. He has caught some of the illusive dreams upon which youth builds.



A feeling of shock and grief affected the student body and faculty at her tragic death.



SUPERINTENDENT AND SCHOOL BOARD PUSH

IN 1950-51 the Board of Trustees of the Laredo Independent School District authorized Superintendent J. W. Nixon to make a survey of building and educational needs of the Laredo system. He immediately called in Dr. B. F. Pittinger and Dean T. H. Shelby of the University of Texas. After a carefull survey of our present system, the two educators recommended a 6-3-3, grade system. This arrangement would relieve our crowded senior high school by moving the ninth grade to our junior high school. It would provide space in our senior high for future increases.


UNDER THE 6-3-3 plan the seventh through the ninth grades would be housed in our present L. J. Christen and in a new junior high building. All grades one through six will be housed in each elementary school. The survey further recommended construction of three elementary schools. A junior high school in the heights area was urged. Exact locations of these new schools were arrived at by a study of our student population, so as to build schools in areas where students live, eliminating long travel to and from schools.



CONSTRUCTION OF 4 NEW SCHOOLS

THE RECOMMENDATION of the survey team called for a bond election of not less than \$1,500,000 for construction. In summary the bond issue was voted by 1504 to 5 on November 14, 1951. Another step toward progress in educational administration was the separation of the Laredo schools from municipal control on October 9, 1951. This vote carried 1932 for and 8 against.

ON AUTHORIZATION of the Board of Trustees and on recommendation of Dr. Walter Cocking, a national figure in education, the firm of Caudill, Rowlett, Scott and Associates of College Station, Texas, was contracted to do the programing and architectural designing for our new schools. This firm will be associated with Architect A. Leyendecker of Laredo.


THE THREE PROPOSED elementary schools will be located as follows: Site No. 1 Corner Sta. Maria and Garden Streets, 12 room elementary school, Grades 1-6; Site No. 2 new Saunders school, located on 6 blocks of newly acquired property between Springfield and Monterrey streets, 20 room elementary school, Grades 1-6. 
















THE THOMAS EDISON SCIENCE CLUB




