








Dedication





LAREDO SITE OF FIRST PUBLIC SCHOOL

From the Laredo Times, Sunday, January 17, 1954—By Jack Yeaman, Times Staff Writer

Laredo is the fountain head of public education in Texas.

The first public school was established here in 1783. This startling and history-shaking revelation was dug up by Seb Wilcox and confirmed by early Spanish

Now it has been publicly admitted by the authorities of the State.

Dr. Frederick Eby, noted Texas philosopher and educational-historian, basing his assertion on Wilcox's research, in an article in **Texas Outlook**, the magazine of 60,000 school teachers, states: "The first school on Texas soil, other than a mission or a parish school, was established in Laredo in 1783 for the purpose of educating the settlers' children and civilizing and Christianizing the American Indians."

On March 22, 1783, only 28 years after Don Tomas Sanchez led his little band of settlers into the wilder-

ness to found Laredo, a school was ordered established for the education of the town, Seb Wilcox states in a brilliant review of education in Laredo, which he has just prepared.

On that day, he continues, Don Santiago de Jesus Sanchez, lieutenant chief justice of Laredo, acting with his witnesses, Joseph Francisco de la Garza and Jose Alejandro Vidaurre issued their order for the opening


of the school, based on a Royal Decree from the Governor of the Province, directing that within eight days all citizens having children of school age should place them in school to learn to read, and that those not old enough to read should be sent to learn the Christian doctrine.

The original order, which is in Wilcox's possession, further commanded that the owners of farms and ranches having children under their care or in their service up to the age of 12 years, who were not well instructed in the doctrine, should be sent to the new school for that purpose.

During the regime of Mirabeau B. Lamar, second president of the Republic of Texas, public lands were set aside for public school purpose.

In his first message to Congress Lamar declared: "A cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy, and while guided and controlled by virtue is the noblest attribute of man—The present is a propitious moment to lay the foundation of a great moral and intellectual edifice which will, in after ages, be hailed as the chief ornament and blessing of Texas."







Across from San Augustine Church in the plaza stands a red marble monument erected by the State of Texas. The inscription reads as follows:

"Original Site of Villa de Laredo founded by Tomas Sanchez, May 15, 1735 by order of Jose De Escandon, colonizer of Nuevo Santander.

Chartered by the King of Spain and organized as villa de San Agustin de Laredo in 1767... incorporated in the state of Tamaulipas, Mexico in 1821... Concentration point for the Mexican Army under General Santa Anna during the Texas revolution, capital of the republic of the Rio Grande in 1839... temporarily occupied for Texas by General Alexander Somervell in December 1842, occupied November 8, 1846 for the United States by Captain Mirabeau B. Lamar under General Zachary Taylor... Incorporated as the city of Laredo by the Texas Legislature in 1848.

Headquarters of Colonel Santos Benavidez during the Confederacy. Ever after loyal to Old Glory. Erected by the State of Texas. 1936"

He graduated from Allen Military Academy where he completed his secondary education. Mr. Nixon holds a Master of Education degree in Educational Administration from the University of Texas and is a Life Member of the Texas State Teachers Association and the National Education Association. Mr. Nixon also holds membership in the Texas Association of School Administrators and the American Association of School Administrators. He has served this community since 1930. He began as Director of Physical Education in the Elementary Schools, then served as Elementary, Junior High, and Senior High principal before being elected to his present position in 1946.





Mr. Leon Daiches, member of the Board of the Laredo Independent School District, served on the board for thirty-six years.

He was born in Vilna, Russia, and came to the United States at the age of thirteen. HISTORY OF THE LAREDO POSTAL SERVICE

According to Mr. Joe P. Leyendecker, our own "Papa Joe," the first post office was his home. It stood south of San Augustine Plaza. His father, John Z. Leyendecker, was the first postmaster. The mail was brought on horseback from San Antonio two or three times a week. When the weather was bad or the rivers high, the mail often didn't come for weeks.

Later the post office was situated in a little low adobe building on the north side of the city hall.

Today the post office is housed in the Federal Building, which was constructed in 1906. The contractor bid so low on this white granite edifice that the company went broke, and the building was finished by the United States government. Louise Notzon, class of '55, says that her grandfather planted the two large royal palms on the post office lawn.

In 1936, the building was remodeled and doubled in size at a cost of \$285,000, according to Mrs. Jennie Goodman, postmistress for twenty years.

HISTORY OF LAREDO'S WATER SUPPLY

Open the faucet and water spurts out. No miracle, students, but there was a time when the girls and boys of Laredo carried water from the Rio Grande, and housewives took clothes down to wash them on the stones along the river just as they do in some of the villages of Mexico today.

Papa Joe, remembering his childhood, said, "Yes, we boiled the river water and then we put a piece of **nopal** in the barrel to settle the mud to the bottom."


The water works was first located on the river to the right of Convent Avenue.

According to Miss Kathleen DaCamara's "Laredo on the Rio Grande," "Water from the river was delivered to one's door, but it was hauled by a burro attached with chains to iron pegs projecting from the heads of common whiskey barrels that were rolled in the streets. Each barrel of water was sold for one real, worth 12½ cents."

According to Mr. Chester Wine, of the Central Power and Light Company, the first water system was laid in 1883 by a company headed by A. L. McLane. This company had a capital stock of \$100,000.

The Central Power and Light Company purchased the water works in 1925, and in 1928 it built a water plant for processing and filtering the water from the Rio Grande at a cost of \$500,000. The City of Laredo bought this plant and now owns and operates this utility.

RIVER COMMERCE IN THE EARLY DAYS

The Rio Grande has been a road to the sea for the past two centuries. The early settlers floated down river to Matamoros on flat bottom boats or "chalanes." In Matamoros hides were traded for provisions.

Later during the Civil War cotton was shipped down the river as Mexican cotton to escape Yankee blockade. Through the Mexican port of Matamoros the Confederacy imported northern goods. According to records, five thousand bales of cotton belonging to the Confederacy were stored in Laredo during the Civil War, Laredo profiting from this commerce.

Through successive decades the river has had less water in it, and today it is not an avenue of commerce.







Thespians presented a one-act play in the spring. Because Mrs. Babb suffered an arm injury, the club did not put on any plays during the fall semester.



























MILITARY HISTORY OF LAREDO

Perhaps we can divide Laredo's military history into three periods: the early period when Laredo was occupied by various troops, the Ft. McIntosh era, and the air base era.

According to the 1927 edition of La Pitahaya, "There was no military garrison at the time of the inspection (by Capt. Trenda de Cuervo in 1757); the Apaches had not approached the settlement with hostile intent."

In 1789 the first military post was established manned by Spanish troops, which remained until 1821. In the Mexican Revolution when Mexico threw off the yoke of Spain, Laredo then a part of Tamaulipas, remained loyal

"Deaf" Smith, famous in Texas history, tried to capture Laredo for Texas in 1837, when his men fought a battle

near the Chacon Creek. A monument at the Country Club commemorates this battle.

General Alexander Somervell, commanding Texas troops, took Laredo in 1842; Captain Gillespie, commanding U. S. troops, took Laredo in 1846; General Mirabeau B. Lamar, commanding U. S. troops, occupied Laredo in 1847, establishing the first U. S. military post here.

Then the United States government leased from the city 2500 acres of land for a post which was built in 1849 outside the city limits and named Camp Crawford. It was named for George W. Crawford, Secretary of War under President Taylor. According to the Texas Almanac, "The name was changed shortly afterward to Fort McIntosh in honor of Col. J. S. McIntosh, who died in Mexico City, Sept. 26, 1847, from wounds received at the Battle of Resaca de la Palma and at Moline del Rey.

According to La Pitahaya, 1927, "Ft. McIntosh was a star-shaped earth work occupying one acre of land. Within was a fine large magazine of stone with arched roof overlaid with earth." In 1859 two companies of the First Infantry took possession, but the U.S. troops repaired to Ft. Davis when on April 11, 1861, three companies of Confederates under General Santos Benavides took possession of the post. Later two Confederate companies under Captain Refugio Benavides and Julian Garcia were organized. In 1865 Federal troops reoccupied Ft. McIntosh. Abandoned and reoccupied, Ft. McIntosh was finally given back to the city of Laredo. It is now the setting for Laredo Junior College and the International Boundary and Water Commission.

Taking the place of the old Ft. McIntosh and the Cavalry is the air base and its hundreds of jet planes in east Laredo. This was established during World War II, closed, then reactivated as the Laredo Air Force Base, which

at the present time will probably be designated as a permanent installation.


















Our present day athletic contest is not so bloody as the cock and bull fights, popular in Laredo in the past. About the popularity of these sports of Spanish origin a letter dated December 12, 1881, reads as follows:


"Our people are daily growing more enthusiastic over the coming fiestas, and very extensive preparations are in progress, which insures a grand success. Cock and cock fighters, and bull and bullfighters have been engaged both from Texas and the interior of Mexico for this grand occasion. The bulls will be trimmed and slicked, and the cocks pricked, and the hair and feathers will fly on December 24.

In Mexico, this sport is encouraged but in Texas, article 4665, and 672 of the revised statutes of 1879, which reads as follows, may operate as an impediment to this sport: For every fight between men and bulls or between dogs and bulls, and between bulls and any other animal, \$500 for each performance, if exhibited for profit, or upon which any money or thing of value is bet.' Even with this statute, we have got a considerable margin left to operate on.

We need churches and school houses. Besides this there is a large family of orphans in town that would like to come in for their share of the proceeds.

We will have cock and bull fighting even if we have to suspend the statutes for a while."


EAGLES REVENGE CATS 42-13

BENGALS—BOBCATS BATTLE TO A 12-12 TIE





LANIER SPANKS TIGERS 18-7


The Martin High School Tigers were stopped by Lanier's spread formation passes, losing their eighth game of the season.





The Tigers lost the third game and with it the Bi-District before a packed house with local and outsiders at the M.H.S. Gymnasium by a score of 65-50.





THE COMING OF RAILROADS TO LAREDO



"Last summer I went to Mexico on the Aguila Azteca—a good fast train," or "We'll take the Braniff for San Antonio at noon tomorrow." These are bits of conversation that one hears in Laredo, which bus, railroad and airplane services link with the rest of our vast state and with the Republic of Mexico.

Not so long ago Laredo was isolated from the world. In 1881 the first railway came to Laredo. The Corpus Christi, San Diego, and Rio Grande Railroad, our present Texas Mexican, linked Laredo with the coast.

Well, it didn't quite link, because Mr. Joe P. Leyendecker, now in his eighty-fourth year, reminisced, "The railroad didn't quite come into town. It stopped on the east banks of the Arroyo Chacon since there was no bridge over the Chacon. Passengers had to ride horseback out to take the train to Corpus."

In the same year the International and Great Northern (I.&G.N.), now the Missouri Pacific, came to Laredo from San Antonio. In the latter part of 1882 the Rio Grande and Eagle Pass also linked Laredo with the coal mines up

Did you know that Laredo holds the distinction of being the first town west of the Mississippi to have an electric street railway, laid in 1889?

Because of the railroads, commerce with the rest of the world increased; business boomed. Many people came to Laredo at this time.

In fact, many of our advertisers, who have so kindly bought space in our year book, came to Laredo and set up their businesses, which have prospered through the years.




